### Marketing

# HERITAGE CANADA FOUNDATION

The HCF's mission is to preserve and demonstrate and to encourage the reservation and demonstration of the nationally significant historic, architectural, natural and scenic heritage of Canada with a view to stimulating and promoting the interest of the people of Canada in that heritage.

I was pleased to join the board of governors of HCF in September, 2005. The Yukon has some unique conditions and experiences to share with the rest of Canada and I would appreciate any insight into how they can enhance a national perspective on heritage.

Below I have noted some of the interesting new and ongoing activities HCF is involved in. If you would like more information on any of them, please feel free to contact me, or visit the HCF website at [www.heritagecanada.org](http://www.heritagecanada.org).

Some of the noteworthy items and new areas of activity that HCF has been focusing on over the past 6 months, which relate to both programs and governance, include the following:

- The organization has recently hired a new executive director, Natalie Bull, whose energy and expertise is proving invaluable.
- The now-annual Worst Losses and Ten Most Endangered Places has recently been released. HCF has been responding to many of these threatened places.
- Canada's new Governor General will be the patron of the HCF, which means she will lend her name to the foundation and to the cause of heritage preservation.
- HCF is embarking on a stewardship demonstration program at the HCF's flagship property 5 Blackburn Avenue in Ottawa. In addition to longer term management planning, the building may become a site where best practices in conservation are demonstrated and green building technologies as they relate to heritage preservation can be showcased. Recently, the building underwent an energy audit.
- HCF is increasing its focus on partnering with organizations with complementary interests in order to reach the various areas in which heritage preservation is relevant- for

example, organization representing planners, architects, heritage conservationists, museums, parks, municipalities, etc. HCF is looking at ways of keeping heritage preservation at the forefront of various disciplines, while also drawing on the expertise of those organizations.

- HCF is working on a stewardship policy for the organization in order to better define HCF's mandate. This is a large task that is central to the question of what HCF hopes to achieve.
- Staff are developing the program for the fall conference being held in Ottawa with the theme "Heritage in an Electronic Age."
- The organization is working on its various governance and procedural policies, including privacy policy, communications policy, and advocacy policy.
- This year's recent Heritage Day featured promotional and educational materials with the theme "Our Cultural Heritage Places."

In addition, HCF is involved in a variety of programs and activities on an ongoing basis, only some of which are listed below:

- Promoting the annual Doors Open program in which heritage sites open their doors to the public.
- Producing the quarterly magazine Heritage – most recent issue focuses on some of the endangered places.
- Issuing regular communiqués on heritage issues, such as endangered buildings and issues of national significance.
- Ongoing partnerships with local organization
- Remaining a good steward of its 5 properties
- Partnering with its subsidiary, Rue Principales, the Quebec-based equivalent of the Main Street Program
- Operating the annual heritage awards program
- Active in Young Canada Works program
- Ongoing maintenance of the foundation's endowment

## ***The Alaska Highway: A Yukon Perspective***

A small band of correspondents, technical experts, web masters and foot soldiers have created *The Alaska Highway: a Yukon Perspective*, an epic virtual exhibit covering the complex history of the highway's and the Canol pipeline's construction. The stories are told using film footage, sound recordings, textual records and photographs created by the men and women that worked (and occasionally played) on the highway and Canol projects. The exhibit also contains a section that documents the highway's profound impact on First Nations people, wildlife, the environment and the economy.

The exhibit's design mimics the golden age of comic books, capturing the excitement, the drama and the immensity of this wartime feat. The opening of the exhibit will be announced soon...

## **Alaska Highway and Canol Bibliography**

A new bibliography is available on the Yukon Archives website ([www.yukonarchives.ca](http://www.yukonarchives.ca)) of all sources in Yukon Archives pertaining to the planning, construction, and subsequent use of the Alaska Highway and Canol project. The bibliography includes books, photographs, films, sound recordings, diaries, and many other types of records that document these extraordinary events in Yukon's past.

## ***Black History of the Yukon***

In recognition of Black History Month, Yukon Archives, Yukon Human Rights Commission and Yukon Status of Women's Council had its official launch of *Black History of the Yukon* in February. The educational display consists of three panels that focus on the "Early years" (Klondike) period, "the Alaska Highway" period and "Women," with a special feature on Lucille Hunter and her family. ## **Yukon Archival Advisory Program**

David Porter has completed another season as Archives Advisor between June 2005 and March 2006. He carried out site visits to museums and First Nations with archival programs in Whitehorse, Burwash Landing, Haines Junction, Dawson City, Pelly Crossing and Teslin. Conservator Lloy Osburn accompanied him on all the site visits to provide conservation advice and assistance. Advice on archival management was provided to the Yukon Enrollment Commission and the Council for Yukon First Nations. David also introduced the program guidelines and criteria for the new National Archival Development Program (NADP) to seven institutions. The Yukon Archival Advisory Program is made possible by financial assistance from the federal government through the Library and Archives Canada Contribution Program for the archival network, in addition to funding assistance from the Friends of Yukon Archives Society.

## YUKON HERITAGE RESOURCES BOARD

Since the Yukon Heritage Resources Board's submission to the Winter 2006 Newsletter, YHRB has held two 2-day meetings (February 3/4 and April 7/8). Some of the work and activities that the Board focused on include:

### 1. Strategic plan

- Review of Mission, Vision and Values
- Review action plans to include YHRB mandatory activities as outlined under the UFA and the *Historic Resources Act*
- Board will continue to refine the plan
- When completed, the Board will share its strategic plan with governments and the heritage community

### 2. Yukon Historic Resources Fund (YHRF)

- Annual intake (October 15, 2005) was restricted to aboriginal language

- initiatives to help contribute to the preservation of Yukon First Nations traditional languages
- As there were some funds left, the Board asked for another intake for projects with a closing date of January 15, 2006
- The Board recommended 4 of the 6 applications received for a total amount of \$26,059; Minister Taylor accepted the Board's recommendations
- The next intake for applications to the fund is October 15, 2006

### 3. Museum Strategy and Implementation Plan

- The final museums strategy and implementation report were mailed out in December, 2005
- The Board recommended that an implementation plan be produced and

that a representative panel to review the museum strategy be established

- The Minister announced March 23 that the Department of Tourism and Culture will work with the heritage community to create an advisory group who will provide a mechanism for the implementation and ongoing review of the Museums Strategy, and will develop criteria for the museums Special Projects Assistance Program
- The Board continues to support the establishment of an advisory group and the development of an implementation plan

#### **4. Language Sub-group committee of YHRB**

- Under Chapter 13 of the Umbrella Final Agreement, YHRB was established to make recommendations to the Minister and to Yukon First Nations on a number of heritage issues, including the means by which the traditional languages of Yukon First Nations can be recorded and preserved
- To recognize the importance of this role, YHRB formalized its Language Sub-group from an ad hoc to a formal committee at its February meeting
- The committee continues to keep itself informed on the state of aboriginal language preservation in the Yukon, the scope and nature of Yukon aboriginal language work in progress and ways and means by which the traditional languages can be further recorded and preserved
- The committee provided comment on the report "Towards A New Beginning" prepared by the Task Force on Aboriginal Languages and Culture for the Department of Canadian Heritage to the new Minister of Canadian Heritage, Hon. Bev Oda. YHRB extended an invitation to Minister Oda to see firsthand how the Yukon is moving along

with language issues, and how Canada can contribute to these Yukon initiatives

- The committee formally requested a seat on the Council for Yukon First Nations' Yukon First Nations Languages Caucus who propose to convene all Yukon initiatives into one entity to protect, promote and preserve Yukon First Nation languages
- The Board supported attendance of its executive director at the recent University of Victoria linguistics course "Language in First Nations Culture"
- The committee will continue to monitor the language situation in the Yukon

#### **5. The Legion Hall, Mayo**

- One of the two imperative responsibilities of the Board is to make recommendations on the designation of Heritage Sites as Designated Heritage Sites (UFA 13.5.3.9)
- The Board regularly evaluates and makes recommendations on the nomination of sites as laid out in our Designation Procedures Manual based on the *Historic Resources Act* and the UFA
- At our April meeting, the Board evaluated the Legion Hall in Mayo as a Yukon Historic Site and forwarded its recommendation to Minister Taylor
- Designated sites are eligible for listing on the Yukon Register of Historic Places and the Canadian Register of Historic Places

We welcome the opportunity provided by YHMA to inform the Yukon heritage community of Yukon Heritage Resources Board recent activities.

## **EXCITING NEW ADDITIONS AT THE YUKON TRANSPORTATION MUSEUM**



In November of 2005 the Museum put in a lease expansion request to include the former tennis court area. The museum was successful in obtaining the additional land. As our museum continues to grow and expand we want to ensure that we have the room for this expansion.

In January 2006 the museum had an excellent opportunity to purchase a steel building (45 x 80 x 20), at an absolute bargain basement price. Plans for the building are to put it on the tennis court area and at present make it storage for overflow in the Hall #2 and to bring some of the outdoor exhibits inside. The building will arrive at the end of April or early in May. We hope to have it up before opening day May 14, 2006. This will require a lot of volunteer effort and we hope that we can get people out to help put the building together. If you

can assist in anyway please contact the museum, we would appreciate the assistance.

As you have seen, we have re done our Bush Pilot Room almost 2 years ago and there were many photos that did not make it back to the walls. We are happy to say that by May of 2006, in conjunction with Virtual Museums Canada's Community Memories Project, we will be launching the online Exhibit "Above & Beyond" Early Aviation in the Yukon. This on line exhibit will include all the photos from the early Bush Pilot Room and some additional ones as well. We hope to have included some interviews with local pilots and aviation historians. ## MIRACLE PLANET SERIES

This past fall and winter the Yukon Beringia Interpretive Centre was proud to present the *Miracle Planet* series in high definition. *Miracle Planet* is a co-production of the National Film Board of Canada, NHK Japan and the Discovery Channel. This five part series explores the evolution of planet Earth. The presentation was made possible by the Alliance of Natural History Museums of Canada.

The screenings were successful in bringing in a total of 1136 visitors for public and school group screenings. The public screenings were accompanied by lectures and presentations by scientists in related fields including Charlie Roots (Canadian Geological Survey), Paul Hoffman (Harvard University), Bruce Bennett (Yukon Environment), Karen Pelletier (Yukon Geological Survey), Paul Matheus (Yukon Palaeontology), and Greg Hare (Yukon Archaeology).

Screenings for school groups were provided for students and teachers from area schools. Yukon Education and the Innovators in the School Program assisted in providing information about the series. The National Film Board of Canada provided educational resources for before, during, and after the students attended a screening.

Satellite screenings at the Northern Lights Centre in Watson Lake brought in 173 visitors to public and school group screenings. Satellite screenings are planned in Dawson City this spring through the Dawson City Museum.

### Great Hall Upgrades

The exhibit reconfiguration in the Great Hall of the Yukon Beringia Interpretive Centre is set for completion this spring. The reconfiguration allows for greater flow through the Centre for group tours and special events. A new introductory exhibit is scheduled to be officially unveiled on International Museums Day, along with a new exhibit featuring the work of George "Rinaldino" Teichmann.

## **PUBLIC SESSIONS TO BE HELD FOR ARTS AND HERITAGE VILLAGE**

WHITEHORSE - Tourism and Culture Minister Elaine Taylor today has announced that the Yukon public will be given more opportunity to comment on the proposed Whitehorse Arts and Heritage Village Development Plan in a series of public sessions.

"Whitehorse Chamber of Commerce and Artspace North are to be commended for their leadership in the preparation of this initial vision of an arts and heritage village for the Whitehorse waterfront," Taylor said. "The Yukon government has reviewed the report and recognizes that the public needs to be given more opportunity for input."

The Yukon government will be working closely with the proponents of the report and other greater stakeholders to develop a process to encourage public participation on the future use of the government's component of the waterfront, at the foot of Main Street, which includes an arts and heritage village.

Further details about the public sessions will be announced in the coming weeks. Ideas from these sessions will be made available for further public review.

"It is essential that any future development on the Yukon government's component of the Whitehorse waterfront reflects the vision and aspiration of Yukon citizens and complements the work already done or being planned by other governments," Taylor said.

The Yukon government supports the Whitehorse waterfront development initiatives to date, which consist of \$425,000 for the trolley extension to Spook Creek; \$500,000 in support of the MacBride Museum expansion; \$609,500 for the Roundhouse relocation and refurbishment; approximately \$110,000 for the restoration of the Fire Hall; and \$9.5 million in Canada Strategic Infrastructure Funds for the waterfront development in support of identified projects by the City of Whitehorse, Kwanlin Dün First Nation and Yukon government. In addition, funding has been provided in support of the Kwanlin Dün First Nation land claim settlement which focused on their development aspirations on the waterfront.

"As a member of Main Street Yukon Society, the Whitehorse Chamber of Commerce and as the president of Artspace North, I am encouraged to see the next steps identified and being acted upon to bring our waterfront alive with arts and culture," Mary Jane Warshawski said.

"The Yukon government remains committed to waterfront development in Whitehorse as evidenced by its accomplishments to date in this area," Taylor said. "The government will also work with stakeholders and interested parties to review the use of the Yukon government owned historic buildings located on the Whitehorse waterfront."
